## **State 4-H Photography Contest**

The 4-H photos must still be uploaded in the correct format that was in the County Photography Contest packet along with name of file. All photos must be uploaded on 4-H Connect by Wednesday, April 15. Make sure the photos are sized correctly as photos that are the size of a post-card will be disqualified.

Senior 4-H'ers who had 1st place photos in the County Photography Contest may register those same photos for the State Photo Contest.

## 4-H Record Books

4-H

Record books are books vou



complete to record your 4-H annual projects and activities. Why is it important you keep a record of your 4-H activities? Because, by recording your activities you can track of everything that you have done, remember all the fun you've had so far, and set future goals! Keeping records of 4-H projects could help you when you apply for college scholarships. It also helps keep track of all your leadership and community service projects.

The deadline to turn in County 4-H Record Books is Monday, June 14, by 5:00 p.m. to the County Extension Office. The record book forms can be downloaded at: http://texas4-h.tamu.edu/recordbooks/ The 4-H record book is made up of a personal information page, 4-H Story and Photo Portfolio, and the 4-H Project Report Form.

We will have a 4-H Record Book Workshop on Wednesday, May 5, at 6:00 p.m. at the County Extension Office. Before coming to the workshop, please view the video that District 12 4-H Specialist Luis Saldana did last year which is on YouTube. This will get you most of the information and our workshop will focus on answering specific questions, etc.

#### **4-H Graduation Cords**

Jim Wells County 4-H graduating seniors who have continued to stay involved in the 4-H program throughout their senior year, will earn their 4-H graduation cords. For seniors graduating in May or June, if the 4-H'er attend 3 4-H club meetings, participates in 3 county events or activities, and lets the Extension Office know by May 1, they will earn their green graduation cord. 4-H seniors will only earn their cords if they follow the guidelines as cords will need to be ordered and there will not be exceptions to earning your cords.

## State 4-H Horse **Validations**

4-H horse validation is now open on 4-H Online. Horse validation will be open from March 1st through May



1st and the cost will again be \$10 per horse through April 15th and \$20 per horse from April 16th through May 1st. The updated 4-H Online will only be accepting credit cards for payment. A few reminders:

- 1. Each validation must include front view, right side view, and left side view images. The entire horse should be included in the photo and marking should be clearly visible.
- 2. If the horse is registered, a copy of the registration papers must be uploaded. These papers must list the 4-Her, parent, sibling, grandpar ent or legal guardian as the current owner. If the ownership is in the process of being trans ferred, please list "pending" in the registration number area. Once the updated registration papers have been received please send a copy to me and I can add it to the validation.
- 3. Uploads must be images, pdfs are not an accepted file type.
- 4. Families should validate each horse once. Once the horse is validated any sibling within that family is eligible to show the horse at district and/or state 4-H horse show.

If you log in on 4-H Online, click on the 4-H'ers name and then animals on the left hand panel. If a family has a horse to validate, please call the Extension Office if you have any questions.

Eligibility requirements for the program are: be in high school or entering high school in the 2021-2022 academic year; be at least 14 years of age by August 31, 2021; be a current 4-H member, or be willing to join a local 4-H club if selected.

Expectations for the program are: 4-H Water Ambassadors accept the responsibility of education youth and adults in their communities; commit to advancing their water knowledge throughout their 12-months of service; participate in the summer 2021 Tier I 4-H2O Leadership Academy (June 27 -July 1); commit to a minimum of 40 hours of education/service from July 1, 2021 - June 30, 2021; pay the \$250 program participation fee by June 15.

The Healthy Texas Youth Ambassador program is seeking motivated, passionate, and hard-



working teens to improve the lives of Texans! Do you have teens in your county who are looking to make a difference in their health and the health of others? If so, the HEALTHY TEXAS YOUTH AMBASSADOR PROGRAM is the perfect opportunity for them to become trained in health, wellness, and safety while helping you grow your local program efforts!

This program is designed for high school age youth (grades 9-12) who have a passion for health and wellness. These youth will be trained at the regional level to become youth health experts who can motivate others to make a change in their lifestyle to improve their health. More importantly, these ambassadors will assist local county extension agents with program efforts, project activities, and much more! Healthy Texas Youth Ambassadors are the boots on the ground component of peer education!

Who's Eligible? Youth do not have to be current 4-H members but must join 4-H for the 2021-22 year. Agents are encouraged to look beyond the 4-H program and recruit youth from local school health advisory committees, health science programs, high school culinary arts programs, home school associations, community and church groups, and other youth organizations.

Eligibility requirements include: Be in at least the 9th grade at beginning of the 2021-2022 school year, Submit online application by May 1, 2021 (https://agrilife.az1.qualtrics.com/jfe/form/SV\_3RisvLKy mQZoPps; Have an interest and passion to serve others in health education which includes nutrition, physical activity, passenger safety, and safe environments!

Expectations: Complete and report 40 hours of leadership, program efforts, or community service annually.; Attend a Regional Healthy Texas Youth Ambassador Summit on July 20; Attend face-to-face and online trainings; Agree to the obligations and requirements outlined in the HTYA Handbook.
